Workshop Gadgets - Leon Kamffer

Milling Machine Vice Stop

When making repeat parts, like a set of axle boxes, it helps if one can easily locate them in the milling vice with a rigid stop.

One gets a few commercial designs but making your own from a few pieces of offcut material is a simple project. Buying a branded one is usually more than most modelers budgets allow.

The design is simple and allows one to adjust the height for different vices, and the other end of the rod can be turned down for small parts. The base is slotted so it can be fitted on more than one machine with different T slot spacing, and to move it when the height is adjusted.

Mine was used when the 24 axle boxes for the electric locos were drilled and tapped, speeding things up tremendously.





The Tuesday gang added cant (also called camber or super-elevation) to the curve exiting the second tunnel. This means the outer rails were raised slightly above the inner rails, helping trains lean into the bend rather than fight against it. On full-size railways, this reduces wear on the wheels and track, and in our case gives a smoother, more stable ride and higher speed running (not required at CSME!). It's a small change, but it makes a big difference when you're riding behind the locomotive!









Want to shunt your 5 inch loco on a 7 1/4 inch track? No problem! All you need is a MOP, steel, gate motor wheels and Johnny Sharpe:





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How do you assert if your coal skip can take 8,7 metric tons of coal?

1) Convert the weight to a volume estimate (so you can compare to the skip's internal volume) 8.7 metric tonnes = 8,700 kg. Coal isn't a fixed density - bulk density depends on type and compaction. Typical bulk densities span roughly 600-1,000 kg/m³. Required volume = mass ÷ bulk density. Examples for 8,700 kg: At 600 kg/m³ - volume = 14.5 m³. At 700 kg/m³ - volume = 12.43 m³. At 800 kg/m³ - volume = 10.875 m³ etc. So, measure the internal volume of the skip (m³), length × width × average depth. If the skip's internal volume is less than the volume above for your coal density, it cannot contain 8.7t.

OR

2) Buy 8,7 tons of coal and drop it in the coal skip! If it does not fit, run steam trains until it fits into the skip!

(you will notice that Johnny is supervising the delivery. A couple of runs with LADY SHAY and the K1 will reduce the overflow of the skip to normal design levels!)




